# **GOING DEEPER/ Dixon First Reads Together**

**Joel:** *Characteristics:* The literary genius of Joel shines through in the book's structure, which flows smoothly from start to finish. Each section relates to what precedes it and what follows it. Hence, it helps to read the whole book in one sitting before studying its parts. The focus of the book is twofold: (1) The ever-present, practical problem of what to do about the locust plague (1:1-2:27); and (2) The future Day of the Lord, of which the current plague is a sig (2:28-3:21). In combining the two—event plus interpretation –Joel is performing the classic function of an Old Testament prophet, that of conveying God's revelation. Likewise, the borrowing of phrases from other prophets to speak a "new word" from the Lord in a new setting shows that Joel was probably an educated person, and had heard, if not read, the prophecies of Micah, Jeremiah and Isaiah. In 2:28-3:21, Joel expands the apocalyptic dimensions of these prophets. In Acts 2, the apostle Peter expounds the meaning of Joel's prophecy.<sup>1</sup>

**Monday:** *Joel* **2** *Heart-Rending Call and Promised Spirit* Have you ever sensed God's call to do battle? If so, with what or whom?

Do you think repentance of heart can be true without "fasting and mourning"? If so, how? If not, what do you think a spiritual fast we need for a repentance of heart would include today?

When do you believe God would take pity on you or your church?

Have you ever felt a sense of shame? If so, when and why? If not, what do you think would make you feel a sense of shame?

#### Tuesday: Joel 3, Blessed Zion

What is your image of God? Does it allow or demand a judgment on sinful nations or persons? If the presence of the Lord in Jerusalem made it holy (v.17), then what does the Lord's presence in your life mean?

**Amos: Historical Background:** By 800 B.C. both the northern kingdom (Israel) and the southern kingdom (Judah) had reached new political and military heights. Peace reigned and business was booming. Even religion was on the rise. However, the exterior calm belied Israel's inner disease. Idolatry, extravagant indulgence, and a corrupt judicial system ran beneath the surface. In this context, Amos calls for social justice as the foundation for true piety (5:24).<sup>2</sup>

#### Wednesday: Amos 1: Judgment on Israel's Neighbors

Have you ever felt unqualified to do something for God, but did it anyway? If so, how did you get past the fear? If not, what would be a challenge for you that you cannot handle alone?

Have you ever been criticized? If so, how do you feel, defensive, embarrassed, or accepting?

#### Thursday: Amos 2 : Judgment on Israel

If you were given the task of judging Israel's sins listed here, which would you judge more harshly? Why?

What do you think will happen without repentance when Israel's sins are addressed? What about your case?

#### Friday: Amos 3 : Witness Against Israel

If your behavior is going to cause you or others problems, how would you prefer to be warned, face to face, by letter, by phone, or in a support group?

How might you become more free from your possessions, so that you might become more free with your possessions?
